Kevin Duffus is Executive Producer of the 5-station project. Individual segments of "No Joy in Mudville," featuring local perspectives, are being provided by consortium members WRAL-TV (collegiate basketball and softball); KSTP-TV, St. Paul-Minneapolis (youth and co-recreational sports); KOMO-TV, Seattle (women in sports); WJLA-TV, Washington, DC (the physical price paid in professional football); and WCVB-TV, Boston (the rise and fall of a hockey sports hero).

Formed in 1979, the Eighth Decade Consortium is a group of broadcasters committed to exceptional, locally-originated TV programming. The coordinating station, WRAL this year, rotates every year.

Two hundred thousand Hurricane Tracking maps are being distributed in WRAL-TV's ADI. Viewers will be able to track hurricanes by watching WeatherCenter. In addition, the maps, produced by Doug Peedin, give tips on hurricane preparedness and emergency procedures.
